Mike Cole from Castleton, VT

(The featured member this issue is Ron Scholtz. He has been a member on and off over many years, in fact he was one our founding members. He has grown a variety of giant vegetables, growing a new State Record Marrow last year!)

Where do you live and how many years have you lived there?

I reside in Williamstown, Vermont and have lived here for 25 years.

What do you do for regular work (if retired what did you do for work, how long)?

I work at Agway in Montpelier, Vermont.

What is your family status, married, kids, pets, etc? Do you have any other hobbies?

I am married and we have two adult children. We have two dogs and one cat. I try to go fishing whenever possible.

How many years have you been growing giants?

I have been growing giants for 20 years

How did you get interested in growing giants?

I went to the Topsfield weigh-off in 1998 and joined the New England Pumpkin Growers Association (NEPGA) in May of 1999. I wanted to see if I could grow a really big pumpkin and I felt by joining this association that they would give me a better chance than if I did it on my own. I enjoyed being a part the NEPGA so much that Dick Rodgers and myself went to the State of Vermont and received a grant to create the Vermont Giant Vegetable Growers Association in 2001.

What do you like most about growing giants?

The aspect I like the most about growing giant vegetables is achieving a goal you set for yourself during the winter months. I have always wanted to grow a 1,000 lb vegetable. In 2018 I was able to achieve this goal with the mentoring of Danny Boyce with a 1,138 lb pumpkin. I have turned my attention now towards growing giant marrows and giant field pumpkins. I believe I do better at growing giant marrows than pumpkins.

What is your biggest challenge or obstacle in growing?

For myself, the biggest obstacle I face is daylight hours. For me, my patch does not get direct sunlight until 8:30AM and it starts to lose sunlight by 5:00PM. I think the lack of sunlight impedes on my potential.

Do you have any help in the patch?

In the early years when the children were younger, I would say yes, but not so much anymore.

What is one thing you've done that you think has improved your weights?

Some things that have helped increase the number on the scale are getting an annual soil sample, talking to other growers and the use of soaker hoses.

Any words of advice for new growers?

I would say for them to get involved with a group like ours. It is important to network with other growers and learn what goes into growing giant vegetables. I don't believe you can do this solo sport alone.

It is still early, but we have close to 80 lots to offer so far. If you have seeds that you would like to donate, please reply to the club email and I will give you the details. In past years, our members have shown great support by bidding on the auction lots and we are hoping this is a continuing trend. Please remember that the club has only volunteer positions and the funds raised goes directly to VGPG events and the weigh off.

Membership 2021 : If you haven't already done so please renew your membership. Dues are only \$20 per year. Your dues cover annual seed swap, Winter Meeting, Summer BBQ and Patch Tour and Weigh-off in September, as well as bi-annual Newsletter. What a deal. You can register by mailing form and check to Ann Squires or you can pay on-line via PayPal from our website. <u>http://vermontgiants.tripod.com/id26.html</u> You will need to have signed up as a member by March 1st, 2021 in order to receive seeds from our club distribution as well as to qualify for a VGPG 1000 plus pound fleece jacket in 2021. You can still sign up as a member throughout the year as well as at our weigh off but won't be eligible for the current year seed distribution or 1000-pound fleece jacket award.

Our seed distribution will again be organized by Dan and Holly Boyce who have graciously done this for many years. Our Vermont club is one of the few in the world that collects seeds from the membership and distributes them to members. In past years, packets have contained 15-20 great genetic seeds thanks to our growers. We welcome contributions. **If interested, send 50 individually packaged seeds by early January to:**
